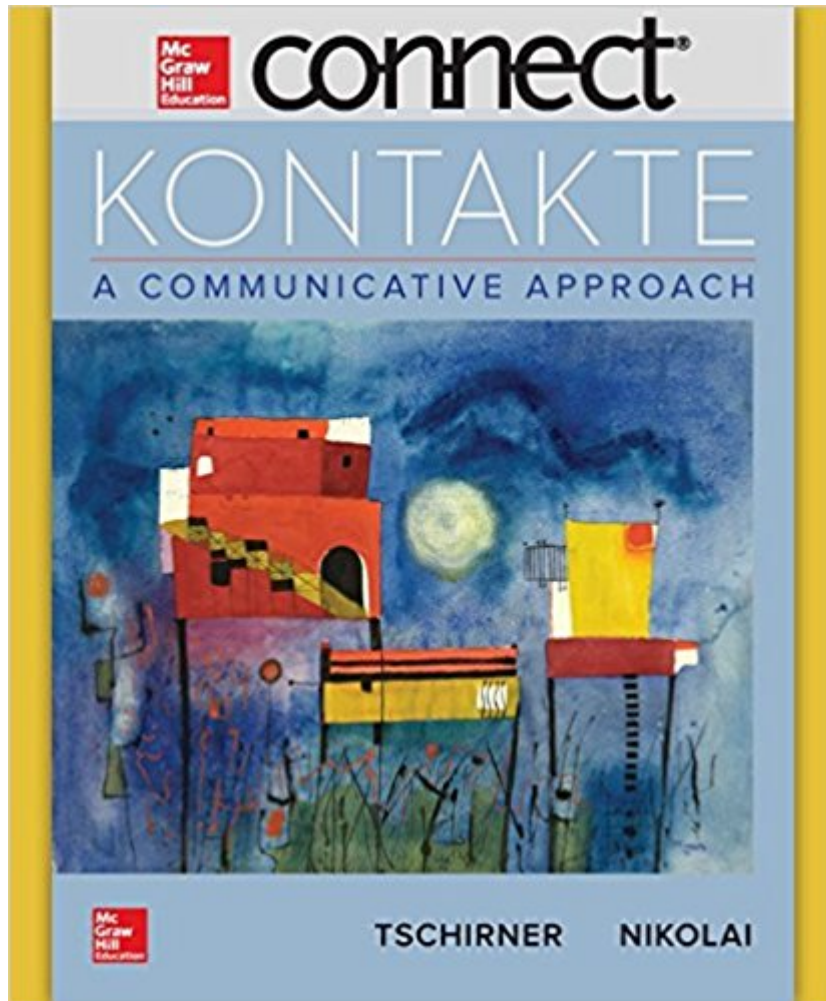

Getting the card with code was the easiest part. The online application is horrible. The first time I tried to login I had to spend an hour on the phone with tech support. The issue was with their application not being able to handle a password larger than ten characters. Good luck trying to use IE. I had to install Firefox in order to use the website. There are a lot of videos and audio files you cannot access if you are trying to run it in IE. The online version does not correspond with the book at all. Page numbers are different online. Software is poorly developed. It's unfortunate you are forced to use the software and book for college German courses. It's very expensive for what you get. Horrible product!

Dear German Instructors, I get it. You are busy. In fact, I used to be a teacher myself, so I know better than most what it is like to stay up all night grading papers. This product sounds great because it handles that for you. I also know that you care. Unfortunately for you and your students, the assignments on Connect are absolutely terrible. They are confusing and the online version of

the book is poorly formatted to the point of being virtually useless. As I am nearing the completion of German 101, I thought I might provide you a few examples of just how terrible this product is for your students.1) Connect displayed a picture of a bedroom and asked, "where is the alarm clock?" I answered, "on the floor." Connect counted that wrong. The correct answer was, "on the carpet."2) Connect displayed a picture of a man standing by a door and asked, "what is he doing?" Not having the language attainment to be able to answer, "standing by a door for some unknown reason," I answered, "visiting a friend." The "correct" answer per Connect was, "going to work." I could find no evidence that this man was a bouncer and, honestly, I am still wondering why Connect thought I could garner that he was going to work from the information provided. In fact, the picture was so vague that I would not be surprised if next semester they decide to save money by replacing all pictures with just this one of a man standing by a door.3) The sections on modal verbs were even worse. The examples did not always make it clear whether the sentence should best be completed by "must," "should," or "want." Just like the two examples above, Connect was simply lazy. They did not provide enough context to make it clear that they were looking for one verb over another. I have gotten As on all of my assignments this semester, but I still find the Connect assignments confusing, unclear, and frustrating. My hope in writing this review is that you, the instructors, will start to demand more from textbook companies. They know that students have to buy the book and pay the license fee, so they do not listen to us. It is possible to do online homework well, but McGraw-Hill failed on this one.

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
