


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# Faroe Islands, 3rd (Bradt Travel Guides)

James first travelled to the Faroe Islands in 1992 and has been back and forth ever since.

Specializing in the Nordic countries, he has written a total of five guidebooks. He has appeared on Faroese television and radio and is known in the islands as the author of the Bradt guide – the only English-language guide to the islands. James is currently learning Faroese.

This is about the best guide I've found so far. So often the guidebooks are full of clever phrases and outdated information. This author knows and loves the Faroes and provides truly useful information in a respectful, but not overcooked manner. Since it was the only print guide we could find on the

Faroes, I didn't expect much of it. But having used multiple guides about other destinations, I'd have to say this was the most useful I've found. I only wish the author had mentioned that there are no public laundry facilities in the Faroes right now! Nevertheless, I may now be a fan of Bradt guides. I hope others are equal to this.

If you are traveling to the Faroe Islands, this is THE guide to take with you. Clear descriptions, with plenty of general background, but not too overwhelming on detail. Practical advice and up to date. Particularly useful in the Kindle edition. The Faroes are relatively "undiscovered" - but they are a magical place to visit, and this guidebook will be an ideal companion for those who make it.

Once on the Faroe islands it did turn out this guide book was pretty useful for information on hiking routes and restaurants.

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
